Bob Barr is a research scientist (fluvial geomorphology and hydrology) at the Center for Earth and Environmental Science at IUPUI. His research focuses on understanding the physical processes and form necessary to achieve and maintain healthy stream systems in a changing landscape.

Elizabeth Mabee is the Conservation Partnership Manager at Indiana Department of Natural Resources. Elizabeth will update guests on the progress of the State Wildlife Action Plan (SWAP), currently in the planning phase state-wide, to map the path forward for Indiana's non-game species of greatest concern.
